I am often asked if we hear stories about how providing a 'hand up' can impact a child's future. What is the tangible difference that KidsCan and our donors make? I would like to share with you one of the many messages we receive from children who have benefited from KidsCan's support. I love this as it highlights how providing something as simple as a pair of shoes can help ignite passion for a school subject and set a student on the path to a rewarding career.

"Hi KidsCan, I went to intermediate school in Wellington in 2014.

"You helped so many of the kids in my school so much. I knew kids who would get to eat because of your programmes. One of my best friends was the second oldest of 5 kids, every day she would have to walk for 40 minutes to get to school, after getting all her siblings ready for kindy and primary school. She got to wear a warm coat and shoes without holes in them because of you.

"I personally got one of your jackets and a pair of shoes, I kept the jacket for almost an entire year and then gave it to a close family friend once I grew out of it and they still use it today. Because of having correct shoes, I got to participate in the art programmes and wood work classes. I carried on with my passion for art and building after intermediate and I'm now working towards building my own little house.

"I don't believe that I would have found my passions for these things if I hadn't been part of those classes and you guys were the reason I could go."

This inspiring story and the thousands of others we hear are the reason I get up in the morning to come to work. The KidsCan team is dedicated to ensuring that children living in hardship have the same educational opportunities as their peers. In 2017 with the support of our donors, sponsors and our partner schools we will do even more and I want to thank you in advance for being a part of it.

# What should we do when the hardship is hard to see?

I'm going out on a limb and guessing that most of us can't imagine what life's like for the tens of thousands of New Zealand children in genuine hardship. The sad truth is their lives can be pretty much invisible to those of us working in nice offices and living in good homes – or any homes for that matter.

But what about the child you see whose shoes are falling apart? That might be one of your few clues of the significant disadvantage too many children are experiencing.

If you're reading this newsletter, I'm probably preaching to the converted. But you won't know if that child in the broken down footwear is getting the proper food they need to grow. No presents for their birthday. Not going to the doctor when they're sick.

That's one of the truly insidious things about child poverty: its invisibility.

The new year marked six months in my new role as Children's Commissioner. Alongside the JR McKenzie Trust and Otago University, we've just released the annual Child Poverty Monitor. While the situation hasn't got worse, it's no better either.

I am genuinely disturbed by the extent of the issue and the significant challenge we face as a country.

By any measure there are around 85,000-90,000 New Zealand children doing it really tough. Those are the ones both in low

income households and in material hardship – going without seven or more things they need, such as shoes, proper clothing, good meals and doctor's visits. If they're in a car it probably won't have a Warrant of Fitness.

Of course we do get insights into child poverty. In December, there were lines of people queuing for Christmas food parcels and children's presents outside Auckland City Mission. A few weeks earlier, I visited the Mangere East Family Centre and spoke to families who are finding it very difficult to get by. This was not the 1960s and 1970s New Zealand of my childhood, or even early 1980s Mangere where I worked in the community law centre.

KidsCan is doing great work to support disadvantaged children's needs through schools. And there are many other groups also doing excellent work in the community. We all need to push harder than ever this year to get more people helping as well.

As a child, I went to Rongotai College in Wellington. Back then and now, the boys there come from a mixed income community; some from well-off families and others are struggling. I'd hate to look in now and see a kid walking by with broken down shoes.

That boy might not have lunch with him. He might not have been to the dentist for years. He might be shivering at home during the winter. The shoes might be the only clue to all that.

I'd challenge anybody to look at the children at their old school and think it's ok if they're living in poverty.

# Pork Pie Charity Run


It's happening again! 60 MINIs and their intrepid teams will muster in Kaitaia at Easter for the fifth Pork Pie Charity Run and the second run in support of KidsCan. After 6 days and 7 nights on the road, only the best prepared, the fittest, the strongest, the desperate, cunning, and the most courageous will arrive in Invercargill.

Over 2,500kms of New Zealand's roads will be travelled. The teams will encounter some of the country's biggest pot holes, wettest valleys, climb through cold mountain passes, cruise along South Island straights, pass through our biggest cities and friendliest rural towns in their trusty MINIs, all while raising funds for disadvantaged Kiwi kids.

#### "It's wonderful to reflect on the successes of 2016 – the biggest one being that KidsCan now supports 621 low decile schools across New Zealand!

"This means that KidsCan programmes are now provided in 58% of all decile 1-4 primary, intermediate and high schools in New Zealand, including 78.4% of all decile 1 schools and 76.1% of all decile 2 schools which is over 143,000 children. Our staff members were able to conduct visits with over half of these schools during the year, an experience which is valuable for learning about the needs in school communities and keeping schools up to date on all the ways in which we can support them.

"These visits, along with letters we received, have provided some great feedback from schools about the positive ways in which KidsCan is impacting their students. One of the most exciting things we hear regularly is that attendance levels increase because of the support we provide!

"When KidsCan surveyed its partner schools in 2016, 75% reported the most common food issue they have is children arriving at school

without having had breakfast and without any lunch for the day. The top two issues are nutrition/hunger and head lice infestations, with oral hygiene and skin infections being third equal.

"The beginning of the year can be a particularly stressful time for those families on low incomes, as there are many extra costs associated with getting children set up for a new school year. We know there are many Kiwi kids who are heading back to school without the basic essentials that they need, and we will continue working hard to raise funds this year to support as many schools and children as possible.

"In 2017 a key focus will be on improving our food, health and clothing programmes. We received some fantastic feedback via the survey, which will help to inform these changes. It is important that KidsCan continually review products and processes to ensure that we are meeting the needs of students living in hardship."

"Our Health Champions, parents and school staff report seeing a lot more head lice at this time of the year which can happen from sharing hats and towels. Some tips for keeping head lice at bay:


- Ensure children brush their hair every day and encourage them to run a nit comb through their hair after every shower.
- If you don't have access to head lice product, you can use the wet combing method by smothering hair with conditioner and combing out the lice and eggs.

"Did you know skin infections are one of the most common reasons children are hospitalised in New Zealand and many of these are preventable? The KidsCan team works alongside staff from the Hawkes Bay DHB to try and ensure minor skin infections do not get worse and require hospital treatment. Some tips from our Skin Champions include:

• Don't leave it too late. If a child has a sore that looks red, is hot or seems to be getting bigger, see a doctor straight away. It's free to take children to their doctor if they are under 13.

- Make sure children keep their finger nails short and clean. Encourage washing hands regularly.
- Try to keep children from being bitten by mosquitos. Insect bites are common and can get infected easily.
- Keep sores and scratches clean and covered. Sores should be cleaned using fresh, clean water."

#### How did you first get involved with KidsCan?

# What would you tell someone who is thinking about donating to KidsCan?

"It's a great feeling to know that you are helping improve the opportunities and prospects for at least one child in our own country."

#### How did you first get involved with KidsCan?

"My partner had just started to get back into work after he broke his back, so I wasn't needed as his 'carer' anymore. I decided it was time to get back into work, got a phone call and an offer from KidsCan for a three-month temp job — I started the next day! The three months went by so fast and I ended up being offered a permanent position."

#### What's your first memory of working for KidsCan?

"Walking into the office at probably one of their busiest times of the year, the lead up to Christmas. Everyone was so friendly and welcoming. The cohesion between all of the teams was great to see and is amazing to be a part of."

# What do you find most challenging working with children living in hardship?

"Knowing that there are children who don't have a choice. Visiting schools in low decile areas and witnessing first-hand how grateful the kids are for a jacket, some warm socks and sturdy shoes, and the ability to have food when they need it makes the job so rewarding but also heart-breaking to see such a need of basic items."

#### What might people be surprised to know about you?

"I love Microsoft Excel! The fact that it can make a tedious or laborious job easy and quick is great. There is always something new to learn."

#### What do you do when you aren't working?

"We have a small farm running cattle, sheep and pigs. So when those guys are looked after, I like to play with the dogs, ride dirt bikes, stand-up paddle board and do some target shooting."

#### Chefs on Tour




